In 2022, 19 young people between the ages of 13 and 21 were murdered in the context of dating violence or stalking. Addressing firearm safety and healthy relationships with young people is equally critical, as 16 of the 19 young people were killed by a perpetrator with a firearm.

All victims were female or non-binary individuals. All the young people who perpetrated the violence were male-identified. Three of those who killed partners with a firearm were under 18.³

70%

More than 70% of victims of child sex abuse by a known adult also witnessed intimate partner violence.²

TX is #1

In 2022, Texas had more incidents of family annihilation than any other state since 2020.

These cases resulted in 40 deaths, including 34 homicides and six suicides. Most of those homicides were perpetrated by men and teen boys with firearms, and the majority included killing an intimate partner, children, and in-laws.³

1 in 15

1 in 15 children are exposed to intimate partner violence each year, and 90% of these children are eyewitnesses to this violence.¹

2023 – A YEAR IN PICTURES



In 2022, 216 Texans lost their lives due to Intimate Partner Violence.
IN OUR SERVICE AREA: Family Violence cases have increased 44% since 2018. Sexual Assault cases have gone up 33% in the same period. Intimate Partner Homicides doubled between 2019 and 2022. BATP saw a 38% increase in hotline calls and a 13.6% increase in shelter days provided in 2023 vs. 2021.

One sunny day in my early 30s, I was parked at a red light on Highway 3 in Webster and glanced in my rear-view mirror to see the male driver fist-punch the woman beside him in the face so hard my heart and stomach instantly ached, and I felt her pain. I had never witnessed anything like this. The act was so unjust and incredibly violent that I wanted to get out of my car and stop it. But I knew I could not. The feeling of helplessness was overwhelming.

Many years later, I learned about Bay Area Turning Point. That memory – still clear as the day it happened – immediately returned, and I realized I could help women, children, men, and families in local communities who suffer from violence and abuse by supporting this small, dedicated team and their mission.

Now, 20-plus years later, I have seen my dollars directly improve the lives of many victims. BATP's need is greater than ever. I continue to give and hope others will, too.

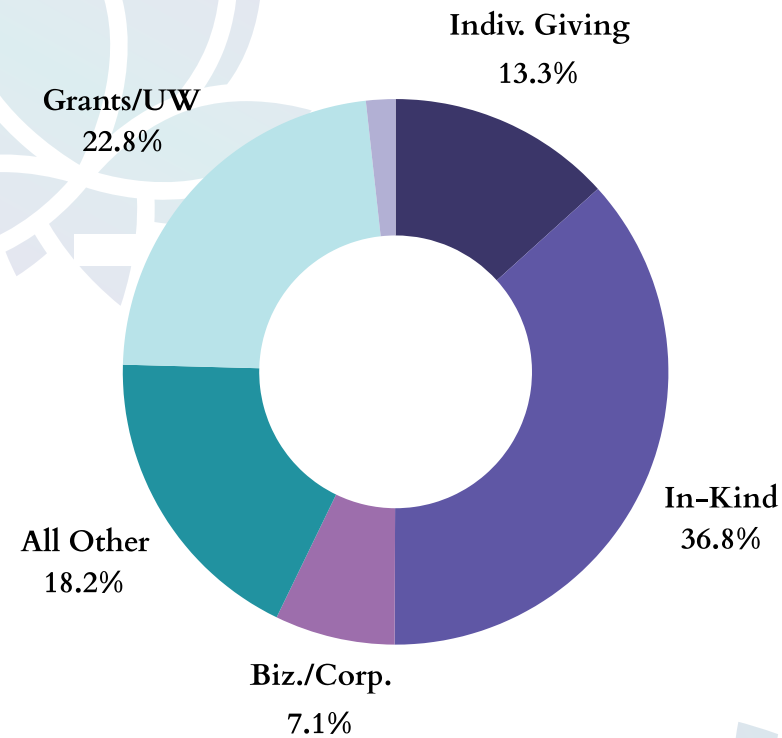

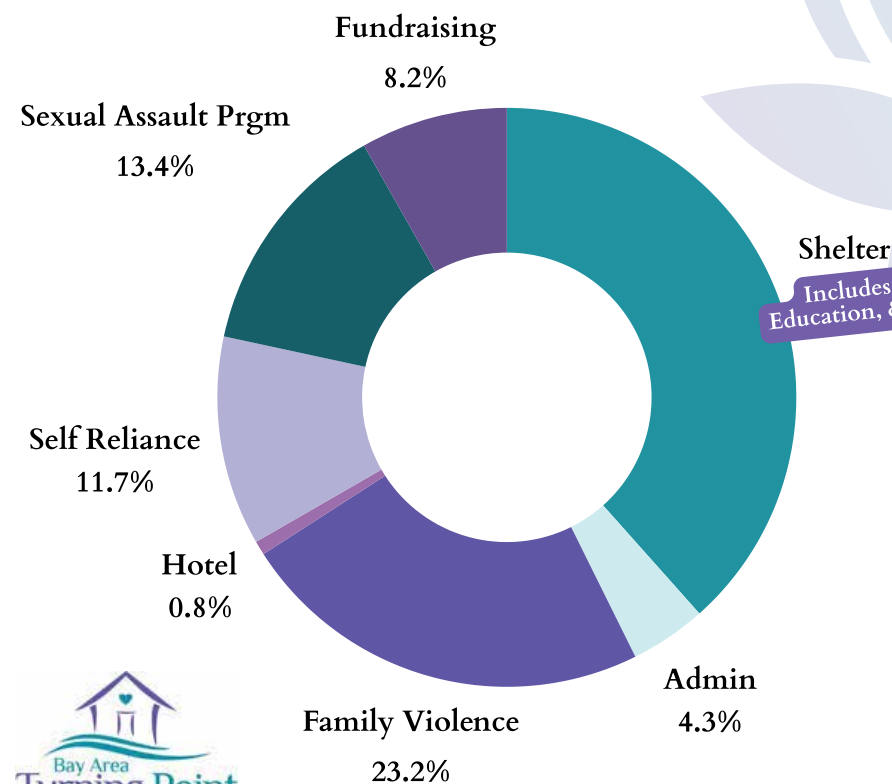

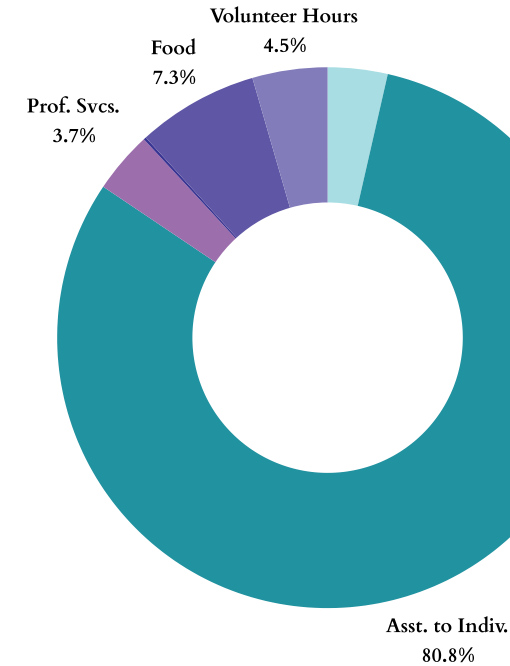
